THREE DAYS

Held just after Labor Day, Windmill Weekend has something for everyone. The three-day festival features a parade, live music, arts and crafts, and a talent show. Held Friday to Sunday, September 11-13.

500,000

Serving nearly 500,000 visitors each year, the Salt Pond Visitor Center is a good starting point for a visit to the National Seashore. Watch park videos, view exhibits on the region's history, and map out a great day.

100,40

The Fort Hill Rural Historical District offers a glimpse into what life was like in the early 1900s. The National Park Service maintains this 100-acre (40 hectare) area just as it was a century ago. Great spot for bird watching!

3580

Fried seafood and a quick round of mini-golf is a perfect combination. Enjoy both at Arnold's Lobster and Clam Bar—an icon for more than 35 years—at 3580 Route 6. Don't forget to top off your visit with a sundae!

300

Due to erosion over the years, Nauset Light had been nearing the edge of a 60-foot cliff before it was moved back about 300 feet in 1996. Tours are available on select days, May to late October.

3 PASSENGERS

Three *Mayflower* passengers—Constance Snow, Giles Hopkins, and Lt. Joseph Rogers—are buried in Eastham's oldest cemetery, Cove Burying Ground. The cemetery is at the corner of Route 6 and Pine Woods Road.

ONE

The Nauset Marsh Trail winds along marshes and through fields offering spectacular vistas along the way. The one-mile loop begins and ends at the Salt Pond Visitor Center.

4

Bass and pickerel can be found in each of Eastham's four freshwater ponds: Depot, Great, Herring and Minister. Grab a pole and spend a quiet afternoon waiting for a bite!

Sam's Deli offers a smorgasbord of 17 sandwiches, including roast turkey and curried chicken salad. Headed to the beach? Head to Sam's first to select a sandwich, salad, or sweet to enjoy on the sand.

The Eastham Windmill was built in Plymouth in 1680–335 years ago. After a few moves, the windmill was placed on the Eastham Town Green, where it has now stood since 1783. Tour the Cape's oldest functioning windmill in July and August.

3 SISTERS

Years before Nauset Light arrived from Chatham in 1923, Eastham had three, 22-foot wooden lighthouses. The three lights were distinguishable to sailors from Chatham's two and Truro's one. View the "Three Sisters" off Cable Road.

2

The Schoolhouse Museum has two main attractions: the historic, one-room schoolhouse that served students until 1936, and an addition housing town artifacts. Open select days during the summer.

Be sure to turn up at the 12th annual Eastham Turnip Festival Saturday, Nov. 21. The event focuses on the ever-so-sweet Eastham turnip and features a Turnip Cook-Off, and a market stuffed with local produce and products.

Take a trip around the world without leaving town at Karoo Restaurant. Karoo provides a 21-item food dictionary to help diners navigate menu items such as "bunny chow" (bread bowl) and "monkey gland" (steak and rib) sauce.

First Encounter Beach is the site of the historic first meeting of the *Mayflower* Pilgrims and the Native Americans in 1620. With stunning views of Cape Cod Bay, it's a favorite with vacationing families.
